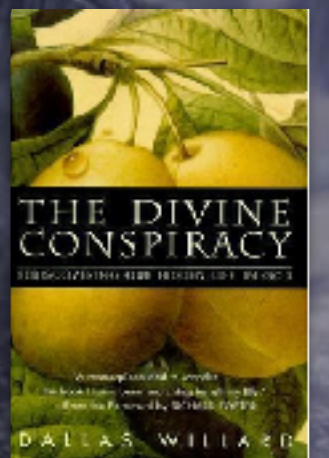
II. The Good Life Is Centered On God

"When Jesus tells his disciples to call God 'Father', then, those with ears to hear will understand. He wants us to get ready for the new Exodus. We are going to be free at last. This is ... the hope of the coming of the Kingdom of God. ...
The very first word of the Lord's Prayer, therefore (in Greek or Aramaic, 'Father' would come first), contains within it not just intimacy, but revolution. Not just familiarity; hope. ...
That's why calling God 'Father' is the great act of faith, of holy boldness, of risk. Saying 'our father' isn't just the boldness, the sheer cheek, of walking into the presence of the living and almighty God and saying 'Hi, Dad.' It is the boldness, the sheer total risk, of saying quietly 'Please may I, too, be considered an apprentice son [or daughter].' It means signing on for the Kingdom of God."

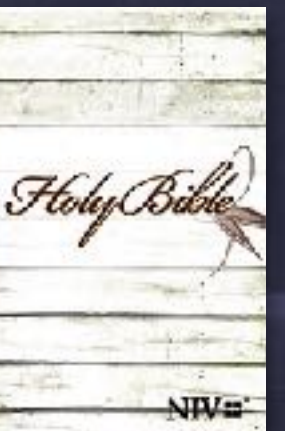
